## Minutes of the Annual Meeting, January 23, 2023

Meeting called to order at 11:51 AM

**A motion was made by Geoff Brown and seconded by Jeremy Dakin to have Beverly Becker be the clerk of the meeting. Motion carried, all in favor.**

Beverly Becker, Clerk, announced the list of voting members and asked if there should be anyone added or removed. Pastor Heidi added Debra Carter to the list. Beverly asked for a **motion to accept and ratify the voting members, with the addition. Motion made by David Beers and seconded by Bill Jenks. Motion carried, all in favor.**

The minutes of the 2022 Annual Meeting were presented as part of the Annual Meeting report. **A motion was made by Geoff Brown and seconded by M.E. Freeman, to accept the minutes of the 2022 meeting. Motion carried, all in favor.**

Pastor Heidi thanked the outgoing vestry members Barry Anderson (who was at the meeting) and Scott Frost, and the Rev. John Carter who is retiring as our Hispanic minister. She also thanked Tim Ward for bringing 2 men from Trinity Glen when possible. Pastor Heidi has enjoyed doing the online bible study, and it is going well. And she has really enjoyed the Sunday School children. It has been so fun and inspiring for her.

Pastor Heidi presented the slate of officers, vestry members and diocesan delegates:

Linda Lloyd, Sr. Warden, M. E. Freeman Treasurer, Bev Becker, Clerk, Vestry members: Alan Swide, Theresa Kenny, Mike Cuoco, Jim Conzo, Marian Beers and Al Dorf. Diocesan Delegates are Bev Becker and Jim Conzo. Carol Taylor volunteered to be the alternate delegate for 2023.

**A motion was made by Geoff Brown and seconded by M.E. Freeman, to direct the clerk to cast one ballot for the 2023 slate of officers, vestry and delegates. Motion carried, all in favor.**

Treasurer's Report: M.E. Freeman reports that we are keeping an eye on our expenses, but with the electricity and oil up who knows. We currently have a deficit budget but are hoping to rectify this. All employees received a raise.

**Motion made by Linda Lloyd and seconded by Sally Harris to accept the Treasurer's Report for the financial year 2022. Motion carried, all in favor.**

Stewardship Report: M.E. Freeman is still getting some last-minute pledges and hopes we can have a balanced budget.

Hispanic Ministry Report: **A motion was made by Barry Anderson, seconded by Jeremy Dakin to accept the agreement between Trinity Episcopal Church Lime Rock, the ECCT, and the Rev. Felix Rivera, Deacon, Hispanic minister.** "The Rector of Trinity Episcopal Church Lime Rock with the Vestry concurring contracts with Rev. Felix Rivera Deacon to serve as the Hispanic minister and the leader of the La Misa at Trinity Lime Rock Church beginning January 29<sup>th</sup>, 2023. A deacon in good standing, the Rev. Felix Rivera agrees to exercise this ministry under the terms outlined in the agreement letter".

Donations were made from the Venous Seguro account to four food banks. Each received \$250: The Corner Food Pantry in Lakeville, to North East Community Center in Millerton, St Thomas in Amenia and to Fishes and Loaves in Canaan. Donations will still be accepted, and the Vestry will be the administrator of the account.

Music Report and Video Production Report: Christine Gevert reported that she is grateful to be back in the church both for choir singing and for Crescendo even though the group has shrunk.

Flower Report: Pastor Heidi thanked Theresa Kenny for all she and the flower committee have done.

Altar Guild Report: Pastor Heidi thanked Bev Becker for all she and the Altar Guild have done.

Outreach Report: Pastor Heidi thanked Bev Becker and reported that Bev feels we need more people on the committee. Currently we have Bev Becker, Pastor Heidi, Cheryl Duntz, Jim Conzo and John Oler who will join us via zoom.

Art Report: Pastor Heidi reported that MaryAnne Carley is also retiring from being head of the art show. Her daughter Theresa Kenny will now be head, and MaryAnne will be on the committee. Theresa is hoping to have an art show early September. Thus, there will be two shows for the 150th anniversary.

Communications and Verger's Report: It would be nice to have an Owl to help with the bad zoom reception. Pastor Heidi thanked Geoff Brown, for all the years he has done the Rota. Pastor Heidi told us all of the hidden work that he

does in getting the services on You-Tube and tracking the response of people coming to view either a Sunday service, the pageant or a funeral, as well as the live stream. M.E. Freeman thanked Geoff for pushing us all to get our reports in and for making the Annual Report.

Diocesan Convention Report: Beverly Becker stated that there is a report for each. She has tried to convey to all of you both what Bishop Jeff has said and what she feels he is like. That he is a spiritual, passionate, humorous and caring person.

The balance of reports of the ministries of Trinity Church were presented and the authors of the reports said they were grateful for the opportunity to serve the Church. **A motion was made by John Oler, seconded by John Lloyd to accept all the reports.**

OLD BUSINESS: Nothing to report.

NEW BUSINESS –The 150th Anniversary Committee: We have a need for a better way to pick up Zoom video. This would apply to Vestry meetings as well as annual meetings, and any other hybrid activities that we have here. Geoff suggests that we possibly try to raise a little money (\$1,000) so we can buy an OWL unit, a camera thing that tracks voices, reproduces voices and pictures of the speaker. John Oler suggested inviting Rev. David Sellery or a former pastor in New York (he preached at John’s sister’s church), who has written a book, for either of them to come speak to us. Christine Gevert recommended a company that was used during a Crescendo concert in Stockbridge to displays images on the walls. She will give the contact information to Pastor Heidi. Cost is approximately \$2,500. Bishop Laura will be coming to visit us on July 9, 2023, to celebrate the 150th Anniversary of the laying of the Cornerstone and to bless our new Chapel.

The annual meeting for next year will be January 21, 2024 with a snow date of January 28th 2024.

Bishop Jim Curry will be coming to Salisbury on June 10th to the Hewat Community Garden, on Salmon Kill Road, to demonstrate turning guns into plowshares.

Motion to adjourn was made by Theresa Kenny and seconded by Jeremy Dakin. Motion carried, all in favor.

Pastor Heidi ended the meeting with a blessing at 12:43 PM.

## Wardens' Report

In a time of dwindling church attendance, we at Trinity continue to offer “Companionship along the way”. This year has been a slow return to pre-Covid days but our music ministry continues to flourish, with some returning, and some new, choir members. Our Sunday streaming is going well, with people watching from other states, and even other countries. Heidi continues to provide wonderful pastoral care to us as well as at Geer and Noble Horizons.

We provide outreach to the community and Christian education to our children. Our art shows bring people from all over through our doors. While our Hispanic ministry is struggling we have one, which is more than any other church in the area. We continually look outside the box for new ways to let the world know we are here. I've always felt Trinity was a small but mighty church.

We have a budget deficit for 2024, something that causes great concern to the Vestry. I don't take this lightly. It would be wonderful to have a huge endowment and never have to worry about where the money was coming from but then we might become complacent. This forces us to use our resources wisely and find new avenues of outreach and income. I give thanks for those of you who have already pledged and ask those who haven't yet to please consider doing so. Any amount helps us continue our mission of gospel and community.

## Treasurer's Report

### 2023 FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS AND 2024 BUDGET

The good news is that we ended 2023 in the black and entered 2024 with a small balance in our operating account and, despite the capital expenditures we made in 2023, with a healthy balance of \$26,890 in our capital reserve fund. Our only long-term liability is the loan we received from the diocese during the pandemic. The principal balance of the loan as of December 31st was \$9,315 and we will continue to pay it off at a rate of \$500 per month plus interest.

Virtually all 2023 pledges (save one that became uncollectible due to a death) were paid by December 31st and we expect to receive the small amount of remaining pledge payments soon.

The concerning news is that our 2024 budget shows an operating deficit of almost \$28,000. This is due to a variety of factors including a decrease in the amount of pledges this year (although many pledgers increased their pledges), the continuing high cost of oil and electricity, mandated increases in our diocesan pledge, non-clergy compensation and health insurance, and increased property insurance costs. None of these costs are within our control. The vestry is currently considering measures to address the projected deficit during the course of the year, and it may be that the costs of oil and utilities going forward will not remain at current budgeted levels. It is worth noting that Trinity has had deficit budgets in the past and has always prevailed. We had a significant operating deficit at the end of 2022 which we overcame in 2023 and I hope that we will be able to do the same in 2024.

## Sunday School/Youth Report

### **Sunday School Report for 2023**

Sunday School was very active in 2023. The Sisk and Kenny families were the principal attendees, and at times there were also guests. Theresa and Brian Kenny, Jarrod and Michelle Sisk and Susanna Schindler were present in the room with me. And Susanna led us in some wonderful creative activities. One of our main goals of the year was to become more familiar with the events of the church year and have fun while doing it. Our grand overview tour of the Book of Common Prayer continues into 2024 so that we will have visited every section of the prayer book.

Other activities in 2023 included having an illustrated sermon at a 10:30 service when the children drew pictures of salt and light and bushel baskets while I preached about Chapter 5 of Matthew's Gospel.

We burned palms on the Sunday before Ash Wednesday, and I hope we'll do that again this year on Sunday, Feb. 11. We'll have to see if the weather cooperates.

We read together a book written by Rev. Dr. Mark Bozzuti-Jones, Director of Spiritual Formation at Trinity Retreat Center. It was the story of the life of Absalom Jones, the first Black priest in the Episcopal Church.

We reinstated the Thank Offering at a few services...when possible to do so (when all the Sunday School children were there together.) The children have not yet designated a recipient for the donations. The total collected so far is \$205.50.

On Easter Sunday the children helped to hide Easter eggs for the second round of the Easter egg hunt (for the children who attended the Misa de Pascua.) We tried to do an Earth Day planting on April 22, but rain foiled our efforts this year.

We painted T shirts to express the importance of love and the Holy Trinity. We baked bread that was blessed for Holy Communion.

We had a fun activity, "making a world of our own," in the parking lot on Trinity Sunday. Each participant created an image of what they would like the world to look like. What a big job God has!

Susanna led us in activities of painting, embroidery, map making and painting garden rocks for Mother's Day and decorating picture frames for Father's Day.

Towards the end of the year, we all worked very hard on learning the 23<sup>rd</sup> psalm. And Emma helped the adults at coffee hour to wrap presents for children and adults for the December *Misa en español* service.

And lastly, in Advent, we turned our focus to putting on the annual Christmas pageant. In addition to our stalwart children and adult characters, we had new participants this year because a Ukrainian family has moved into town. The theme of the pageant was teaching the younger children the most important Bible Stories: Creation, The Exodus, Incarnation, and the Resurrection.

This year we look forward to having Teddy, Jack, and Parker take their first communion at a service in the spring. And on Sunday, October 27, when Bishop Laura Ahrens visits us, God willing, Emma and Brennan will be confirmed, and Jarrod and Michelle will be received into the Episcopal Church.

## Communications Report

This report combines the former Verger's Report and Communications Report, addressing the fact that our "footprint" is both in-person and digital.

**Our livestream, via locallive.tv**, remains our principal streaming vehicle. It is clear that the ability to view the service via livestream, either live as it occurs, or afterwards, has ceased to be just an accommodation for Covid and is now an expectation. The Sunday last year with the fewest viewers was June 25, when only five people viewed the livestream. But 42 viewed it on Trinity Sunday, and an average of around 17 people view the livestream each week. So, when you're in church on a Sunday and you're near the front, take a moment to wave to the camera during the Peace. You will be waving to real people who are worshipping with you at Trinity Lime Rock!

During the year, due to limited audience and the time commitment involved in editing and uploading (often unsuccessfully) each livestreamed service, I decided to upload only highlights this year to **YouTube**. Our YouTube channel, @trinitylimerock, now has 99 subscribers, up from 94 last year. Among the most popular videos this year have been Easter (53 views), the Bishop's visit for the cornerstone celebration (46), Palm Sunday (45), and the Christmas Pageant excerpt (44). All-time, *Pie Jesu*, sung at Trinity by the American Boychoir in 2007, now has 9829 views, with the Palm Sunday service from 2007 with 8427.

As noted last year, we no longer use **Twitter** (now called "X").

The website, **trinitylimerock.org**, continues to evolve. We now publish a post each Sunday morning with the bulletin and information about the day's activities and links to them. Your suggestions are appreciated!

The **Trinity Update e-mail newsletter** continues to appear weekly, and regularly includes the **Rector's Letter**. Circulation is slightly up, to 328 last year versus 320 in 2022. The open rate is now in the high 40s, significantly up from last year.

**Zoom** continues to be an accepted way of meeting at Trinity. The popular weekly Bible Study is 100% remote via Zoom. Sunday Coffee Hour is hybrid, using the Owl, permitting remote attendees to interact with those physically present in Lime Rock. Vestry meetings are hybrid, again using the Owl. The Annual Meeting will again be hybrid. The Owl device considerably improves the hybrid experience, although we are still learning how to use it most effectively with larger groups.

**Facebook (and Instagram)** are occasionally useful to increase visibility in the larger community. Our presences in the “Meta” world are:

--Facebook Group – 132 members (up from 126 last year)

--Facebook page -- 551 followers (up from 543). Meta seems to have spontaneously spawned two additional Facebook pages for us, and we will attempt to remove these additional “presences” this year.

--Gallery Facebook page – 346 followers (up from 336 last year).

--Instagram account – Currently 1907 followers, up from 1664 last year.

This is our most popular Meta offering and we hope to devote additional attention to it this year.

**Print Advertising:** The *Lakeville Journal* remains as the principal print advertising vehicle for the parish, and we especially appreciate the editorial coverage they give us. They are a wonderful resource for the entire community.

## Diocesan Convention Report

**Annual Convention of the Episcopal Church in Connecticut**, October 27-28, 2023 and the Hartford Convention Center.

The following are the highlights of the convention:

- A presentation on the importance of Safe Church training for all those involved in children’s education and for all members of the Vestry.
- A resolution calling for the repudiation of any negative or hateful rhetoric aimed at transgender people. (passed)
- A resolution to allocate \$20,000 from the ECCT endowment to investigate the extent of the ECCT’s involvement in the institution of slavery in the U.S. (passed)
- A resolution acknowledging the 150th Anniversary of the Abolition of Slavery in the state of Connecticut and the complicity of the ECCT in the institution of slavery in America. This resolution was the dominant resolution of the convention and proposed the establishment of a 2.5-million-dollar fund taken from the diocesan endowment to be used as

initial reparations for those most directly harmed by slavery. Much debate took place on this resolution which centered on two main issues; does money really absolve us of our involvement, can't we just be terribly sorry and repentant? And secondly, should we be including in reparations the indigenous peoples who have also been hurt again and again by the white settlers in Connecticut and in an ongoing manner by our government and individuals out to rob and in every way undermine the native peoples of our land. Much heartfelt discussion took place on this resolution with the ultimate affirmation that 1, the resolution was specifically about slaves and not the indigenous people and 2, that while money cannot absolve us of our participation in those events it can possibly help in some ways to alleviate the ongoing suffering of the descendants of the slaves. In other words we will be putting our money where our mouths and hearts are. This resolution also passed overwhelmingly. It is to be hoped that next year another resolution will be made regarding reparations of one form or another to the indigenous people.

## Hispanic Ministries Report

### ***La Misa Annual Report***

On January 29, 2023 I began as Missioner at Trinity, Lime Rock, after Rev. John Carter retired in December 2022. I connect with the Latino community who have residence primarily New York State. There are a few who have residence in Connecticut. Most of the community are from Mexico. Some are from central and South America.

Our service (*La Misa*) took place typically on the last Sunday of the month at 4pm. It all depended when the musicians, *Sin Fronteras* (Without Borders), from Christ Church Cathedral were available to provide Spanish liturgical music that is popular in the Latino culture. We had eleven services in 2023. On October 22, 2023 there was no power at the church in the afternoon so we had to cancel it. I am the celebrant during the service of the Word and proclaim the Gospel of the day and share my homily. Rev. Heidi then is the celebrant during the service of communion and I assist in preparing the communion at the altar.

We averaged about 6 in attendance, not including the two clergy, and the musicians. We have had a low of zero attendance to 14. There was that one Sunday where we had no attendance from outside. That Sunday, August 27, I partnered with Rev. Marilyn Anderson. My wife, Carmen was the only attendee that day. It was also a Sunday in which the musicians were not available and Christine Gevert and another musician, Carlos Boltes provided the service music. That Sunday afternoon we blessed donations of clothing prior to distribution for families in need.

I began to connect with the community at least one Thursday a month at the North East Community Center in Millerton, New York at its food pantry. Many of the clients are of Latino background and I would just welcome them to the pantry and introduce myself and tell them of our monthly Spanish service.

We have provided pizza twice after service and on the Saturday, before the third Sunday of Advent we had pizza and gifts to share with the parishioners (I want to thank the Trinity family for gift wrapping the gifts). It was the first service we had at 12 noon on a Saturday. It was decided that during the winter and early spring we would have La Misa on Saturdays at noon.

On April 22, 2023 we had a Latino church community celebration at St. John's, Waterbury, sponsored by the Hispanic Ministry Network. We had attendees from the eight Episcopal churches in Connecticut that minister to the Latino community. Five parishioners from Trinity, Lime Rock attended the event. Our bishop diocesan, Jeffrey Mello, attended and participated in the event beginning with the service in which he was the celebrant and preacher.

I am blessed to have Rev. Heidi Truax both as a colleague and friend and in working together to do this most important ministry. I also want to thank the Trinity family who have welcomed Carmen and me to your fold whenever we attend a 10:30 service. We have found a home in Lime Rock and for that we are so blessed.

May this year, 2024, be one of continued HOPE, FAITH and LOVE at Trinity, Lime Rock and that God accompany us and guide us to do the work of welcoming and serving the wider community.

People could walk in their own neighborhoods and schools and churches could hold their own walks. Trinity walked the Salisbury Rail Trail with Salisbury Congregational Church. Overall, the walk was quite successful. Trinity raised over \$2000 of the \$36,529.57 total that was raised (as of November 2, 2023). Twenty-five percent (about \$9125.) of the official total will be returned the northwest corner to be distributed to local food pantries

and voucher programs in our area. Thank you, Rachel Lamb, for heading up the team.

**Tree Lighting:** On December 2nd, 2023, Trinity again had lights put on our large tree thanks to Perotti Tree Company. We had hot cocoa, but we missed John Lloyd's donuts this year. There were about 50 participants, the most so far. Thank you to Lisa Keller for inviting so many of Lime Rock people from her extensive e-mail list!

Guest singers from Crescendo often join our Chorus. We had a set-back in June due to a Covid outbreak in our group: seven of our fourteen singers got ill. Thankfully we all recovered and were able to continue our music making.
